Three Sure-fire Tips to Help Your Child Succeed in School

Are you aware that you are your child's first and most influential teacher? What you do shapes your child's academic future more than anything else.

A home environments that support learning impact student achievement more than level of education, level of income, or cultural background.

Children whose parents actively participate in their education tend to perform better in school, have fewer behavior problems in the classroom and have higher school attendance records.

Three easy steps parents can take to improve their child's success in the classroom:

One: Help your child improve his or her schoolwork.

Parents have to pay attention to and have an awareness of what is going on in the classroom. And know what type of student your child is. Armed with this information you can monitor homework and actively tutor your child at home.

What about helping a high school student with homework? It is a myth that high school teens no longer want or need help with homework. But you must accept your child's style and work with it.

Two: Form a working relationship with your child's teacher and school.

Make a commitment to have on-going communication with the teacher. This is beneficial for a couple of reasons. You want to keep up on your student's progress and stay informed about memos, grading periods, parent-teacher conferences and school activities.

Participate in school functions. Attend to Back-to-School Nights, conferences about student work, as well as school plays, speech tournaments, and athletic events. Join the parent-teacher association.

Three: Improve your parenting skills.

Just as your child is learning study habits, parents are learning about the skills of raising a child. These are simple, yet complex, and ever changing.

By the time your child is a pre-teen you will realize that the skills that worked before are no longer effective. Younger child are often more obedient and compliant. A young adolescent, however, wants to do things his or her own way and this creates havoc in some homes.

This is the intersection in family-life where most families collide. Parenting needs to shift from manager to mentor. For some parents this is difficult because they still want to micromanage.
